Plant of the month – The above photo shows the Sea Campion (*Silene maritima*)

On a recent visit to the Isle of May, we found the island covered in this pretty white flower, which is a small, clump-forming perennial with tiny, grey-green leaves. The Sea Campion is related to the carnation and is found on the coastline throughout the UK, it grows atop cliffs and amongst shingle and flowers from June to August. The other names by which it is known are 'dead man's bells', 'witches' thimbles' and 'Devil's hatties'. According to folklore, Sea Campion should never be picked for fear of tempting death. Given its habit of growing on the edge of cliff-tops, this was probably good advice!


Finally a ride along the coastline back to the slipway. An exhilarating ride and certainly a good way to start off the morning.

Wildlife Organisation Update

This newsletter features UK wide and local wildlife organisations giving their latest news and events.



The FCCT (Fife Coast & Countryside Trust) have created a new route named the Fife Pilgrim Way and this project is progressing towards completion with the official launch scheduled for 5th July 2019. The route will have sign posting and waymarking and eight orientation panels, nine cast metal discs and four stone rest points to be sited along the route. Other interpretive elements include a free leaflet, companion book, pilgrim passport, walking map and FPW merchandise, which will be available once the route is open. Scottish National Heritage (SNH) Education and Visitor Pavilion, Tentsmuir National Nature Reserve

The construction of a new bespoke pavilion, designed by local architect Kirsty Maguire was formally opened on Friday 14 June 2019, by SNH Chief Executive, Francesca Osowska, and Newport Primary School pupils and the event was attended by four residents from Drumoig.







The pavilion will provide a gathering place for educational groups as well as providing a focal point for visitors to Tentsmuir Point to learn about the seasonal wildlife and nature on the reserve as well as the history of the area.

Suitable for groups of up to 40 people, the pavilion is situated close to the Ice House, one of the main visitor entrances on the reserve.

The pavilion was jointly funded by SNH and Fife LEADER through the European Agriculture Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD) and the bid was boosted by over 80 letters of support from individuals and organisations.

Tentsmuir National Nature Reserve (NNR) boasts constantly moving sand at the edge of the sea to the colourful dune heathland. Seals haul themselves out of the water to watch the world go by, while hungry birds fill up on the rich mix of food hidden in the mudflats. Inland, you can discover the hidden gem of Morton Loch and search for birds like the shy teal dabbling at the water's edge and the elusive otter. Swifts take incredible migration routes each year, but sadly the RSPB has seen a 53% decline in their breeding numbers between 1995 and 2016. SOC (The Scottish Ornithologists Club)

Have launched a free mobile App called 'Where to Watch Birds in Scotland'. You can download it from the App Store or Google Play.

It is designed to help users to discover where to birdwatch in Scotland and the bird species likely to be seen at featured locations. The app has launched with details of nearly 400 of Scotland's top birdwatching spots and there is a good number close by to us. They will add and update existing ones on an ongoing basis. The app uses BirdTrack to provide a list of the latest species reported at featured sites. Users are also encouraged to help bird conservation by submitting their sightings via direct links to the Local Bird Recorder and BirdTrack. Ticks

The tick season has begun. Ticks become active at temperatures above 8°C. Protect yourself by covering your skin, applying a repellent, and always carry tools for safe and quick tick removal should any attach themselves to you. The wooded areas and the areas with long grass around Drumoig are known to have ticks, and anyone walking through these areas should always check themselves and their pets afterwards. Big Garden Birdwatch 2019 Scotlandresults

Throughout the UK, 472,758 of you counted a staggering 7, 669,138 birds. Once again, the noisy and gregarious house sparrow took the top spot, with the starling in second place. See below for the top 10 birds in Scotland.
